Career Pathway Spotlight:

Carpentry

As the third step in gaining a Level One Industry Certification in Carpentry, this pathway builds knowledge in the building materials used in the carpentry craft, as well as teaching techniques for reading and using blueprints and specifications related to the carpentry craft such as masonry, plumbing, and electrical craft trades. The pathway provides specific knowledge and skills in site layout and floor and wall framing systems, and includes basic industry terminology for a carpentry craftsperson. 
